Purpose:	To seek Cabinet approval for an increase in the establishment of the Police Force of two (2), so that a two-man Police Gold Squad can be formed, consisting of 1 Sergeant and 1 Constable, who will specialise in and be fully occupied with the investigation of all criminal activity associated with the Gold Mining Industry, and security, as well as liaison with mining company staff and relevant Government Departments.

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COMMENT ON CABINET SUBMISSION No. FORMATION OF A TWO-MAN NORTHERN TERRITORY POLICE TITLE: ... GOLD SQUAD

COMMENTS:

The Police Force Gold Squad was a Budget initiative. Discussion on the matter in the Legislative Assembly debate on the Budget indicated that the proposal would be funded by the imposition of a levy on the gold mining industry. The Submission states that establishment and ongoing operational expenses will be "partially offset" by a levy on Territory gold producers.

Those operational expenses are costed in the Submission at \$220 000. The Chief Minister indicated in the Legislative Assembly that the estimated costs were \$150 000.

It is not clear from the Submission whether the estimated \$220 000 is the cost to the Government as it is not clear what will be the amount raised by the levy on gold miners.

As discussions on the levy to be paid by gold miners has not been concluded, it would seem that a decision on the matter may be premature.

THE ISSUES

To seek Cabinet's approval for an increase in the 1. establishment of the Northern Territory Police Force of two (2), that a two-man Police Gold Squad can be SO formed, consisting of 1 Sergeant and 1 Constable, who will specialise in and be fully occupied with the investigation of all criminal activity associated with the gold mining industry and security, as well as liaison with mining company staff and relevant Government Departments.

BACKGROUND AND CONSIDERATION OF THE ISSUES

- 2. Over the past 12 months there has been a marked increase in the number of gold mines operating throughout the Northern Territory. Currently there are 16 mines operating whereas 12 months ago there were 11.
- 3. Production has increased. 5296 kilograms of gold ore, valued at \$97.3 million was mined in 1986. In 1987 it is estimated that 10000 kilograms, valued at about \$200 million will be produced. Production for 1988 suggests that the 1987 estimate will be doubled.
- 4. However, as the number of mines and production has increased, so has the amount of criminal activity. During the past 12 months there has been reports of thefts of large amounts of gold, resulting in major police investigations. These include:-
 - (a) In December, 1986, between \$250,000 and \$300,000 worth of amalgam (unprocessed gold) stolen from the goldroom of Nobles Knob mine at Tennant Creek.
 - (b) \$60,000 worth of amalgam stolen over a four month period from Pacific Gold Mining, NM Mine, Pine Creek.



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- (c) On 17 October, 1987 \$280,000 worth of electrolyte stolen from the goldroom of the Dominion Mining's Cosmo Howley mine, near Hayes Creek.
- 5. The Territory Chamber of Mines estimates that the Government has lost over \$1 million in gold royalties in the past five years because of theft.
- To date investigations have usually been carried out by 6. members of Police stationed in the area where the thefts have occurred, or if necessary, by Detectives from the major Territory centres being flown to those Experience gained here and in West Australia areas. has shown that a specialised knowledge of gold production and a close liaison with the Chamber of Mines and Department of Mines and Energy as well as mining company staff would greatly enhance investigations. Present extended Police resources and other criminal investigation commitments have precluded any members gaining the required knowledge or liaison. It would be of great benefit if a gold squad is formed, the members of which could devote their duties exclusively to the investigation of gold thefts and other criminal activity associated with the gold mining industry; security; and liaising with mining management and other Government Departments.
- 7. It is proposed to base the Gold Squad's office at Minerals House, Darwin, in accommodation currently leased by Government. Following the West Australian experience it has been found necessary to remove members of the Gold Squad from the mainstream and have them work directly with the Chamber of Mines.

OPTIONS

8. The two options to be considered are:



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- (a) to continue to utilise detectives attached to Criminal Investigation Branches, on a ad hoc basis, at centres nearest to where the offences are reported; or
- (b) form Б Gold Squad with members who will specialise in and be fully occupied with the investigation of all criminal activity and security associated with the gold mining industry, as well as keeping a close liaison with mining company staff and relevant Government Departments.
- Option (b) is the preferred option. 9. Not only will Police investigations into gold thefts be more efficient but the Gold Squad members should, very quickly, obtain the necessary expertise to carry out any of the duties necessary to combat crime in the gold mining industry.

PUBLIC IMPACT OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS

10. The majority of Northern Territory residents would be aware of the increasing number of gold thefts and would therefore see the formation of a Gold Squad as an essential element in improving the Police service to the mining community as well as combating crime generally. Persons contemplating gold thefts and other related criminal activity may well be deterred in the knowledge that policemen with specialised training are available to investigate the offences.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

11. The cost of establishing and running the two man Gold Squad will be approximately \$214,400 for the first year and \$163,000 for the second and subsequent years. A breakdown of these costs is given at Attachment 'A'.



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It should be noted that:

- a) Housing costs will depend on the actual staff appointed to the squad and a high estimate has been given in Attachment 'A'.
- b) Because of the large amount of travelling the Gold Squad is expected to undertake, the squad's vehicle will probably need to be replaced on a yearly basis but the refund to Government will mean a new vehicle only costing about \$8,000 per year.
- c) No allowance has been made for indeterminate costs associated with telephones, electricity, etc., which will need to be absorbed in general ongoing costs.

Government will have to subsidise the formation and running of the Gold Squad until the expanding gold industry is capable of funding the Squad completely. (For example, in the first year of Government would be the cost to operation \$214,400, less \$80,000 levy = \$134,400. However, the following years will see a dramatic drop in the Government's subsidy because there will be no because the gold establishment costs and producers levy will increase.)



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EMPLOYMENT CONSIDERATIONS

- The two members forming the Gold Squad will be selected 12. experienced serving members. They will be selected on the basis of having Criminal Investigation Branch experience as well as the necessary aptitude to be able to be trained to effectively carry out specialised investigations and other associated duties in the gold mining industry. This will entail two experienced investigators being taken from current levels of the Police establishment. It follows that these two positions will have to be replaced as the current establishment level cannot absorb the loss of two members.
- 13. This will necessitate an increase of two in the establishment of the Police Force.

CO-ORDINATION AND CONSULTATION

14. Liaison will be necessary between the Gold Squad members and the Chamber of Mines and the Department of Mines & Energy. This Submission has been sent to those organisations for comment, as well as the Departments of: Treasury; Law; Chief Minister; the Public Service Commissioner and the Co-Ordination Committee.

PUBLICITY

16. Considerable benefit will be achieved from a public announcement that a Gold Squad has been formed (The Government has already publicised the fact that the formation of a Gold Squad was being considered). A draft press release is at Attachment 'B'.



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TIMING

17. Early Cabinet consideration is sought so that, if approved, the members selected to form the Gold Squad can commence their training in Western Australia in April, 1988.

PRESS RELEASE

FURTHER TO THE CHIEF MINISTER'S PRESS STATEMENT ON 28 OCTOBER 1987 ABOUT CABINET APPROVING THE FUNDING OF THE FORMATION OF THE POLICE GOLD SQUAD, THE CHIEF MINISTER, MR. STEVE HATTON ANNOUNCED TODAY THAT CABINET HAD NOW APPROVED THE ACTUAL FORMATION OF A NORTHERN TERRITORY POLICE GOLD SQUAD. THE TWO MAN SQUAD, MADE UP OF EXPERIENCED INVESTIGATORS, WILL RECEIVE SPECIALISED TRAINING AND DEVOTE THEIR DUTIES EXCLUSIVELY TO THE INVESTIGATION OF GOLD THEFTS AND OTHER CRIMINAL ACTIVITY – SUCH AS PROSTITUTION – ASSOCIATED WITH THE GOLD MINING INDUSTRY.

MR. HATTON SAID THAT THE GOLD MINING INDUSTRY WAS EXPANDING RAPIDLY IN THE TERRITORY, UNFORTUNATELY, SO WAS THE INCIDENCE OF CRIMINAL ACTIVITY - ESPECIALLY GOLD THEFTS - SOME OF WHICH HAD RESULTED IN LARGE AMOUNTS OF GOLD BEING STOLEN. IT WAS HOPED THAT THE GOLD SQUAD MEMBERS - WHO WILL LIAISE CLOSELY WITH MINING COMPANY STAFF AS WELL AS THE CHAMBER OF MINES AND DEPARTMENT OF MINES AND ENERGY - WILL QUICKLY ACHIEVE A HIGH DEGREE OF EXPERTISE IN THE INVESTIGATION OF SUCH CRIME AFTER RECEIVING SPECIALISED TRAINING BY THE WEST AUSTRALIAN POLICE.

MR. HATTON SAID THAT THE FORMATION OF THE GOLD SQUAD WAS IN ACCORD WITH THE GOVERNMENT'S POLICY OF PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE POLICE SERVICE TO THE MINING COMMUNITY.
